- Provided food relief for people with disabilities during pandemic in the Madurai district of the Tamil Nadu province in India.
- Offered a webinar in October on Mutual Care in Difficult Times.

We said "goodbye" with appreciation to our executive director, Eldon Stoltzfus, who resigned for health reasons.


Jeanne Davies was named our new executive director.

#### **AMBS statistics**

- In May 2021, 13 men and eight women from seven countries on five continents graduated from AMBS. Eight of them completed at least part of their studies at a distance.
- In 2020–21, AMBS had 128 graduate students 92 admitted students and 36 guest students.
   Eighty-two were from the U.S., nine were Canadian, and 37 were international students.
- In 2020–21, 24 students were enrolled in AMBS's nondegree Journey program in the U.S., Canada and Southeast Asia.

## The Corinthian Plan (MC USA) Mountain States Mennonite Conference Report (2020) – Submitted by Duncan Smith, Director

The overall health of Corinthian Plan (TCP) participants is always our concern. Our underlying question being: "How can The Corinthian Plan best serve participants?" Since early March 2020 TCP has focused on programs and health coverages related to the COVID-19 Outbreak that benefits participants.

To this end The Corinthian Plan (TCP) offered a Premium Holiday (May 2020). Participating groups were invited to contribute, as able, from what they would have paid in May 2020 premiums. This funded short-term grants for groups suffering economic impact from COVID-19. Congregations were very generous with their donations, showing their concern for other participating congregations.

The Corinthian Plan's health coverage, Congregational Employee Plan, also set up some special coverage for COVID-19 participant claims as well as some flexibility for congregations or conferences that needed to reduce staff hours or change the status of an employee on a temporary basis. For general information pertaining to The Corinthian Plan or specific COVID-19 information please go to our <u>webpage</u>.

In 2020 The Corinthian Plan (TCP) ended our self-funded vision plan and began working with VSP. Through joining an established not-for profit system we were able to offer more robust benefits at a slightly lower cost.

The Fair Balance Fund continues to provide subsidies for those TCP participating congregations with need. Funding comes through participating congregations contributing annually, \$10 per average attendee. There are two congregations in Mt. States Mennonite Conference that receive a TCP subsidy.

TCP encourages health and well-being through the *Wellness Incentive*. Each TCP participant can earn up to \$300 annually, \$150 for each of two steps. Couples can earn up to \$600 annually. Employees waiving health and spouses qualify, too. For more information go directly to our Wellness Incentive webpage.

Mountain States Mennonite Conference (MSMC) participates in TCP with 6 congregations/Conference office staff carrying health coverage, 2 congregations waiving coverage, and 2 participating without an eligible employee, for a total of 10. Thank you! Overall, 311 congregations or conference offices participate in The Corinthian Plan with 716 persons carrying health coverage.

## Strong church partnerships a vital part of Everence mission

Everence Financial® works closely with churches and their members, as we have since our organization started as Mennonite Mutual Aid in 1945.

We started our year-long 75th anniversary observance in July 2020 – somewhat differently than planned because of safety precautions related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

While adapting to changes related to the pandemic, Everence holds true to our commitment to help our brothers and sisters in Christ "build up the common life" through decisions about their money and other resources.

We'll continue serving the faith community as partners in stewardship throughout 2021 and beyond.

## Sharing Fund is part of special pandemic response

The Everence Sharing Fund has distributed millions of dollars to our partner congregations over the years, and we added COVID-19 relief to the mix in 2020.



Everence doubled the amount of eligible Sharing Fund grant money available to congregations with Everence stewardship advocates for a large portion of last year.

In addition to the Sharing Fund, Everence joined with Mennonite Disaster Service and Mennonite Central Committee U.S. to establish the COVID-19 Congregational Relief Fund, providing grants to help racially and ethnically diverse churches facing financial crises because of the pandemic.

Much of MCC Central States's work focuses on dismantling systemic oppression, while seeking authentic relationships along a path of decolonization. Up until that time, the office bustled with volunteers who loved to come in and create comforters, recycle, assemble the various kits and fellowship.

At first, we sprinted and held on to hope that this wouldn't last long. However, it became evident that, more than likely, the office would be closed and inaccessible to volunteers. So, the challenges became opportunities to pivot and explore:

- How do we continue to connect with our constituency?
- Is there a way for us to provide a safe avenue for volunteers to participate in the ongoing needs of MCC?

• How do we continue to fulfill our mission of relief, development, and peace in the name of Christ-differently?

First, I am grateful for the staff of MCC CS. Because of their commitment to the mission of MCC and their work, they were energized by the challenges and eager to turn them into accomplishments. Examples of this are:

- The Material Resources Center staff coordinated pick-up and delivery of materials to keep volunteers busy. They also established protocols for smaller groups to come into the warehouse and workroom.
- All of us are engaged, with Donor Relations, to connect with constituency. A "gift" of these times has provided more of us the opportunity to connect with more constituents, virtually. I have had more opportunities to speak and preach at events and in churches than ever before.
- Our programs have created online learning opportunities that have been successful. Human Resources and Young Adult Programs have collaborated to engage in virtual recruitment opportunities.

So, I rejoice- Look at God! God has allowed us to continue our work in amazingly creative and new ways in order that we can continue the mission of MCC.

#### Mennonite Education Agency Report to Mountain States Mennonite Conference July 2021

Mission Statement: MEA will strengthen Mennonite education for restorative leadership, work, and service throughout the church and the world.

#### **Executive Search**

The search for a new Executive Director/CEO has been MEA's main short-term challenge since November 2020. We are deeply grateful for the leadership of Committee Chair **Dick Thomas** and the contributions and dedication of the committee members: **Addie Banks**, MEA Board member; **Jon Carlson**, MC USA Executive Board member and Pastor of Forest Hills Mennonite Church; **Marco Güete**, Director of MEA's Hispanic Ministries Education programs; **Glen Guyton**, MC USA Executive Director (ex officio); **Lisa Heinz**, MEA Staff; **Joe Manickam**, President of Hesston College and representing the Mennonite Higher Education Association; **Carol Roth**, Moderator of the Racial Ethnic Council; **Conrad Swartzentruber**, Superintendent at Dock Mennonite Academy and representing the Mennonite Schools Council (preK – grade 12 schools); **Jolene VonGunten**, MEA Staff and Committee Staff. **Please join us in prayer for MEA and this time of new beginnings.** 

#### **Hispanic Ministries Education partnerships**

MEA operates a Hispanic seminary and a Bible Institute: **Seminario Bíblico Anabautista Hispano** (SeBAH) and **Instituto Bíblico Anabautista** (IBA). These programs offer strong biblical and Anabaptist-based theological education for Hispanic leaders in the Mennonite church that is both affordable and accessible. All of these partnerships strengthen the Hispanic Ministries programs and offer Hispanic and Latino students access to broader educational opportunities within the denomination and beyond.

- In the past year, **SeBAH** has secured partnerships with **Hesston** (**Kansas**) College and Palm Beach (Florida) Atlantic University (PBA), enabling SeBAH graduates to earn transfer credits and automatic admission. PBA is also offering scholarships of up to \$1,100 per semester.
- **SeBAH** is pursuing a similar agreement with **Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary (AMBS)** in Elkhart, Indiana, an MEA-affiliated seminary.
- **SeBAH is 100% online and affordable**. Many students are bivocational and pay their own way at great sacrifice.
- The Hesston College Bible department and SeBAH are offering a collaborative course entitled "Jesus and the Gospels," to be taught in both

- English and Spanish this year to students from both institutions. There are new students enrolled from Venezuela, Honduras, Mexico and the United States. MEA and Hispanic Ministries continue to be deeply thankful for this close partnership with Hesston College.
- **IBA** operates in partnership with local congregations, who provide spaces for in-person study centers. The pandemic forced several study centers to close last year, but we look forward in hope that these centers will be able to re-open as the strain of the pandemic begins to ease.

#### **Mennonite Higher Education Association**

#### **Theological Education Study Group**

MEA is convening a committee of leaders from Mennonite higher education and the church as they analyze the state of biblical and theological education across the denomination. This group was formed in response to concerns voiced by Mennonite Church USA Conference Ministers about the waning interest in ministry studies. They asked, "From where will our future leaders and pastors come?" The group is examining barriers and access to strong theological education and looking for new and creative ways to promote church leadership to students and within congregations. We seek ways to make a lasting, adaptive shift rather than short-term, technical changes. The committee includes the following people:

#### **Higher Ed Board Chair Gatherings**

At their request, MEA is facilitating quarterly virtual gatherings of the higher ed Board Chairs for brainstorming and mutual support and counsel. These conversations have been rich and edifying. MEA is uniquely positioned to offer connection and support to this group, both individually and collectively.

#### **Washington Community Scholars' Center (WCSC)**

MEA is partnering with the Washington Community Scholars' Center to draw more interest and enrollment from students across Anabaptist-Mennonite education. WCSC is a cross-cultural urban studies, internship, and community living experience located in the nation's capital, operated by Eastern Mennonite University. **The WCSC program is not limited to EMU students;** in fact, **Bethel College** and **Bluffton University** regularly send students to WCSC. MEA is helping to extend the invitation to all of the Anabaptist-Mennonite higher ed schools as well as high schools.

#### **Mennonite Schools Council (MSC)**

#### **Resources & Support**

The administrators for preK-12 schools are being regularly resourced by MEA Interim Director for prek-12 Schools Dawn Graber. Dawn offers a background in executive coaching to help leaders clarify their values and vision and to test and discern next steps to meet their personal and organizational goals. There has been strong interest in individual coaching sessions with Dawn. In addition, she has helped plan and coordinate virtual professional development experiences on a bi-monthly basis about relevant and emergent subjects, such as navigating polarization on campuses, emotional Intelligence, and how self-

aware leaders can help create effective and influential relationships. Dawn has also led virtual gatherings of Board Chairs for relationship-building, connection and counsel.

#### **Spring it Forward campaign**

MEA collaborated with MennoMedia and the Executive Board of Mennonite Church USA to encourage constituents to donate the third wave of federal stimulus dollars to the Spring it Forward campaign, an initiative to nurture faith formation in our church youth. MEA awarded grants of \$1,000 each to Eastern Mennonite School, Harrisonburg, VA; New Holland (PA) Early Learning Center; Peace Academic Center, Kykotsmovi, AZ; and Quakertown (PA) Christian School. The grant applications ranged from tuition assistance, professional development projects, and the purchase of a washer and dryer. We are deeply grateful for the generosity of these gifts.

#### **Anti-Racism and Anti-Oppression**

The MEA staff and board are committed to dismantling racism, oppression and white privilege within our systems. As a step in our individual journeys and to broaden our understandings collectively, the MEA staff studied the book **Who Will Be A Witness?** by **Drew Hart** and published by Herald Press. Studying this book together has been meaningful and illuminating for the MEA staff, and we would encourage your congregations – small groups, Sunday school classes – to consider a similar book study.

#### **Jobs in Mennonite Education**

MEA distributes a weekly newsletter to highlight job opportunities in the schools. This initiative was in response to the plethora of job postings on social media and direct requests from some schools to help promote their openings and searches. The newsletter is functioning as a communication hub that schools can utilize at no charge. MEA is well-positioned to provide this service to the schools. #### **Mennonite Disaster Service 2021 Report**

Restoring Hope is the slogan on our MDS t-shirts. What does "Restoring Hope" look like in real life? Here are some samples –

In Arkansas, MDS has a Search and Rescue team that brings peace to families of hikers and canoers that get lost or capsized in the Ozark forestland.

In Minnesota, MDS volunteers responded to the aftermath of the riots following the death of George Floyd by assisting first generation immigrant storeowners with cleanup, painting, and repairs.

In Colorado, MDS volunteers are working on forest fore mitigation by clearing beetle killed trees. They are doing site preparation, mitigation, and wood chipping in response to the forest fires of 2020 in northern Colorado.

In Kansas, the Summer Youth Program built tiny houses to be transported to San Antonio Tx that will be used to house asylum seekers who have recently immigrated and are awaiting further processing by Immigration and Naturalization Services.

In Texas, MDS volunteers will be building homes to offer shelter to asylum seekers at the border in McAllen.

While these and other examples of MDS activity in our region indicate a shift towards recognizing the needs created by Humanitarian Disaster, Mennonite Disaster continues to fill the traditional role of rebuilding for folks after natural disasters strike.

Despite the shackles of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, MDS found ways to mobilize 6048 volunteers nationwide. We recovered 487 homes for folks and built 79 new houses. We deployed to 91 locations to perform cleanup in the days immediately following storms.

We are deeply grateful for the support of our constituency. We appreciate and covet your prayers, your financial support, and most importantly your volunteer hours. We invite you all to plan time this year to be the Hands and Feet of Jesus to a hurting world.
















#### The Land Is Not Empty


#### How to Have an Enemy


#### Tongue-Tied


